



What are Capital Credits? As a member-owned cooperative, Big Horn REA does not technically earn profits. Instead, if revenues exceed the cost of doing business (i.e. expenses), the co-op has earned "margins." These margins are allocated to active members in the form of capital credits in a ratio proportionate to the amount of electricity the member purchased during the year that margins were earned.



How are Capital Credit retirements made?

Big Horn REA issues a check therefore it is important to always inform Big Horn REA of your most current address.

Big Horn REA Board Authorizes a \$842,442 Capital Credit Retirement!

In December 2021, Big Horn Rural Electric Company is issuing checks to our members for the retirement of capital credits. This 2021 retirement of capital credits is for the years of 2001, 2002 and 2003. The retirement includes a percentage of our power supplier's (Tri-State Generation and Transmission) allocations.

What is the difference between allocated and retired capital credits?

Allocated capital credits are the amounts assigned to each member who was billed for service during a year in which margins were earned. While the credits are assigned to members, they are retained by the coop for a period of time—approximately 20 years—and are used as capital, which reduces Big Horn REA's need to borrow money. Allocated capital credits reflect your ownership/ equity at Big Horn REA. When the Board of Directors determines to retire capital credits, a check will be issued.

Capital Credit checks are void after 180 days and are generally not accepted by banks after the 180 days.

Holiday Electric Safety Tips

s the holidays approach, it is a great time to remember those who are close to us. While everything is merry and bright, it's also a time when dangers around the home are increased, especially if you have family visiting for the holidays. There are many potential mishaps that can happen, from Christmas tree lights to ladder accidents, open-flame candles, or oven fires.

To keep up the holiday cheer, and to avoid anything that looks like a 'Griswold's Christmas', we've outlined a list of very important electrical safety tips to follow to keep you and your family safe.

1. As all of us know, decorations and cords get damaged over time and after each use. Before hanging them make sure to inspect all electric decorations for any damage before using them. Don't try to fix them with tape. Toss any damaged items and replace them.

- 2. When hanging lights up outside, make sure to use lights that are designated as "outdoor" lights. Outside lights should have a fuse built into each strand's plug and may be labeled "for outdoor use."
- 3. As much as you would like to be the brightest house on the block, you may have to turn it down a notch, depending on your outlets. Overloaded electrical outlets and faulty wires are a common cause of fires during the holidays. Avoid overloading electrical outlets.
- 4. Make sure your electrical cords aren't getting damaged. Keep an eye on pets and make sure they are away from electrical cords. Electric cords should never be pinched by furniture, placed under rugs, or attached by nails, tacks, or staples.
- 5. Instead of an open flame candle, try a battery-operated candle. Most of the time batteryoperated candles look warm and realistic, without the fire hazard.
- 6. Turn off and unplug all decorations when unattended or



when you are leaving home. 7. If you are decorating a live Christmas tree, make sure to keep it well-watered daily or as often as needed. If real Christmas trees aren't watered regular, the needles get dry and become a fire hazard against the lights that get too hot.

8. Try using LED lights instead of using incandescent lights. Not only are they energy efficient, but they also don't get as hot as traditional light bulbs do. Planning and following safety tips

can make all the difference for an enjoyable and safe holiday season! Source: tristate.coop



At Big Horn REA we offer multiple ways to pay your bill. Here are a few things to keep in mind.

Bills are due on the • 25th of each month. If your account is on draft your payment will be taken out automatically on the 21st of each month. Keep in mind, if the 25th falls on the weekend the due date will

be moved to the following Monday. The same is applicable to the accounts on draft.

• If your account is on bill-pay, keep in mind that it doesn't happen automatically. Bill-pay

payments are mailed to us, so sometimes we get them after the 25th of the month. • There is a penalty of

1.5% for late payments. Late payments are considered the day after the due date.

ast year, it was stated in the December 2020 newsletter the following: "The news for the year of 2020 seemed to be dominated by politics and COVID-19 and seems like it will also be the news talk of 2021." Well then, we can now add inflation and supply chain issues to the news stories that were prevalent for 2021, and probably will be in 2022 also.

Big Horn continues to have great news for 2021 and 2022. At the October 2021 board meeting, your board voted to refund capital credits. The total amount of cash refund to be made in December 2021 is slightly over \$842,000.00! Since 2009, there has been over \$8,100,000.00 of patronage capital refunded to our members.

Even though costs continue

to increase, Big Horn does not plan on a rate increase in 2022. The last increase was a 3.5% increase in 2017 and was for a pass through of wholesale power costs. Big Horn has not had a rate increase to cover the general operations for such things as: plant improvements; line maintenance; right of way clearing; pole testing; debt costs; capital credit payments and for that matter to cover any expenses or costs since the year of 2015. That will be

seven consecutive years of no rate changes to cover operational costs! Big Horn will continue to operate as effectively and efficiently as possible in order to provide quality service and reliable electric energy.

On behalf of the board of directors and employees, we want to say we sincerely appreciate working for you the member/owners and look forward to a productive new year.

Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

LEDs consume far less electricity than incandescent bulbs, and decorative LED light strings such as Christmas tree lights are no different. Not only do LED holiday lights consume less electricity, but they also have a few advantages:

- Safer- much cooler than incandescent lights
- Sturdier- made with epoxy lenses, not glass
- Longer lasting- the same LED string could still be in use 40 holiday seasons from now
- Easier to install- up to 25 strings of LEDs can be connected end-to-end without overloading a wall socket.
