
places like Scotland, Brazil, the Middle East, and Asia as well as Houston and Louisiana.

ATTENTION IRRIGATORS:

As a reminder Big Horn's irrigation rates as well as all other rates have not changed since 2017!

You will see your Annual Horsepower
Charge on the bill you receive the first
part of May. The minimum annual charge
under the irrigation rate will be the
highest of the following:

1. The horsepower multiplied by \$26.

For example – a service with a 25HP motor would be billed 25 x \$26 = \$650.00

2. A charge of \$200.00.

Rusty's Sopaipilla Cheesecake

Ingredients:

2 cans crescent rolls	1 stick of butter
2 8 oz cream cheese	1 tsp vanilla
1 ½ C sugar	2 tsp cinnamon

Directions

- 1. In a 9x12 pan (sprayed with pam) layout 1 can of crescent rolls.
- In a bowl, cream your cream cheese and 1 cup of sugar and vanilla together until smooth (be sure to set your cream cheese out to get soft)
- 3. Spread this on top of your crescent rolls. Lay other can of rolls on top.
- 4. Melt your butter and pour on top of them.
- 5. Mix ½ cup of sugar with your cinnamon and sprinkle over top
- 6. Bake at 400° for about 30 minutes.
